



Commanding Officer's Prohibited Activities and Conduct Policy Statement



From our Declaration of Independence written so many years ago, “We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights....

You are born with the right to equal treatment. You do not have to earn that right nor is it a privilege – it is inherit the moment you take your first breath in life.

PAC violations may include but are not limited to bullying, dissident and protest activities, harassment, hazing, discrimination, sexual harassment, and wrongful distribution or broadcasting of an intimate image. The definitions of prohibited conduct are detailed in MCO 5354.1F. If you observe any of these, it is your inherent duty to step in and take action to prevent and report these violations.

Your chain of command is the primary and preferred channel to prevent and respond to PAC violations. If you are a victim of a PAC order violation and your chain of command cannot resolve the issue, notify the Equal Opportunity Representative. There will be no reprisals or retaliation for reporting.
